#### Numbers & Patterns

- Week 1 To develop an understanding of the concept taking away. To know that the answer is fewer when subtracting.
- Week 2 To be able to understand that doubling means 'twice as many'. To develop the understanding that numbers can be doubled as well as objects. To play with, explore doubling and explore early symmetry.
- Week 3 To develop an understanding of sharing and grouping. To recognise and make equal groups and notice that sometimes there are left over when they share or group.
- ☼ Week 4 To develop knowledge and strategies to be able to solve problems. To record ideas mathematically, make reasonable estimations, explore properties of shapes, refine ideas to find better or more efficient approaches. To reason and explain findings.
- © Week 5 To consolidate and increase understanding of sharing, doubling, adding and taking away.

#### Art — Handa's Surprise

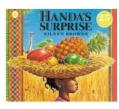
- © Using the story 'Handa's Surprise' by Eileen Browne. As a stimulus.

# PSHE through our whole school programme - Jigsaw

- © Our theme this half term across the school is 'Relationships'.
- © Meditation, looking after own wellbeing and calming strategies.
- © Understanding what make the right choices and how we can follow our golden rules.
- Understanding that the children have rights, including playing and learning.
- © Developing an understanding of what the consequences are of breaking the rules.

#### Music

- © Introduce themselves, say and sing their name confidently.
- © To play and sing at the right time.
- © To recall names of tuned and un-tuned percussion.

In the Summer term, we will be holding our end of year show, which will be a summary of our year. We look forward to welcoming you into the large hall for this performance. 2 adults from each family will be welcome to attend, younger siblings are welcome too if they can sit quietly. #### Water Bottles

As the weather will be heating up as we move into the summer months it is important your child brings a named water bottle into school. The bottles are readily available to the children throughout the day, and they may help themselves when they are thirsty.

#### Sun Protection

After a little taste of sunnier weather over the Easter holiday we are excited for the onset of summer, so in preparation for this the children will need some sun protection. There are creams available that last for 6 hours; if this is applied in the morning before school it will be easier for your child to manage than trying to apply cream during the day. Unfortunately, adults in school can not apply sun cream to children as they are not prescribed creams. Your child may also like to bring a sunhat and some sunglasses, please ensure these are named.

#### Summer Holiday Role Play

During Summer 2, we are hoping to set up a role play focused on going on holiday. We will have suitcases for the children to fill to pack for an imaginary trip. For this we are asking for donations of summer clothes, empty suntan lotion bottles, swimming towels and other associated items.

#### Ideas for Home

Lots of you asked us for ways you can support your child at home. Please check out the attached booklets for Early Reading and Numbers & Patterns for ideas, websites, songs and apps that you could try at home. Please remember the most important thing is reading with your child. Our favourite apps are Teach Your Monster to Read and White Rose 1 Minute Maths. Below are some book reviews, favourites from our teachers that you might enjoy reading at home.

The <u>Healthier Together</u> website is a digital resource designed to support children, young people and their parents/carers. It aims to empower parents and carers — giving them the right tools to manage their children and young people's physical health and emotional well-being.



The section for <u>Parents/Carers</u> covers key areas such as 'Should my child go to school/nursery today', information on a range of common illnesses and childhood vaccinations, in addition to a large section on SEND.

#### Reading Books

To change your child's reading book regularly, place it into your child's book bag with the little red book every day. The class teacher will change it during the day. Please note the titles of the books your child has read in

their little red book so we can ensure they have a different one. Reading with your child for 10-15 mins as often as possible has such a huge impact on their reading and writing skills and development. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT BOOKS ARE RETURNED EVERY DAY AS THIS WILL BE USED FOR GUIDED READING.

# Wednesday Assembly and Rising Stars

The Reception children will continue to attend assembly on a Wednesday afternoon. We have been very impresssed with how the children sit and pay attention. Most Wednesday assemblies will include Rising Stars. Each week 2 pupils from every class are awarded a certificate for outstanding learning or behaviour.
